



Christian Parents Duties to Children.

Christian parents are entrusted with a sacred responsibility to raise their children in love, faith, and wisdom. The Christian duties, as requested during Holy Baptism, BCP 302, are “Will you be responsible for seeing that the child you present is brought up in the Christian faith and life?” “Will you by your prayers and witness help the child to grow into the full stature of Christ? The response to both these questions is, “I will with God’s help.”

Another duty of Christian parents is found in italics as the last part of Thanksgiving for a child on page 455 of the BCP, “. . .to make prudent provisions for the well-being of their families, and of all persons to make wills, while they are in good health, arranging for the disposal of their temporal goods, not neglecting, if they are able, to leave bequests for religious and charitable uses.’ Another way of providing provisions for children each Fall season is getting them ready for school.

I remember the joy of getting four children ready to go back to school. Buying of shoes, socks, shirts/blouses, pants, and dresses. During the summer they always outgrew what had fit back in May. Then there were pencils, notebooks, rulers, glue, etc. In those days we had an average income which meant the month of September was always a strain on the budget. And with four they seldom received the latest styles or the best clothes. Thankfully they didn’t complain about not being the ‘coolest dressed kid’ in the school. We did our best to give them a couple of items they truly wanted. They understood we were considered a large family. Because we created a safe, loving environment that mirrored God’s unconditional love, they knew we’d have given more if we could have.

We all have experienced those times we had to say no. We also understood that we were blessed in not having to deny them things they really needed. We’d watch news reports from other parts of the world where parents had to endure the sorrow of not being able to provide the basics. But we always celebrated the things we could purchase that delighted them, which delighted us, far beyond the pleasure any self-indulgence might have brought us. It still does.

Today, the news reports from many parts of the world show children not being able to attend school due to war, extreme poverty, unstable governments, or limited financial resources. This is heartbreaking and makes me sick to my stomach. Lack of a proper education limits fellow children of God from becoming the kind of person God has in mind for them. What are we to do?

One way we can do this is to support our Backpack Shepherd Program with food once the church receives that information from school counselors. Also praise God for the new Greenway

School completed this summer for elementary students in the area. Another thing we can do is to regularly recite prayer 31, BCP 824, *For Schools, Colleges, and Universities*. And also take time to ask our youth about their school, teacher, and classmates.

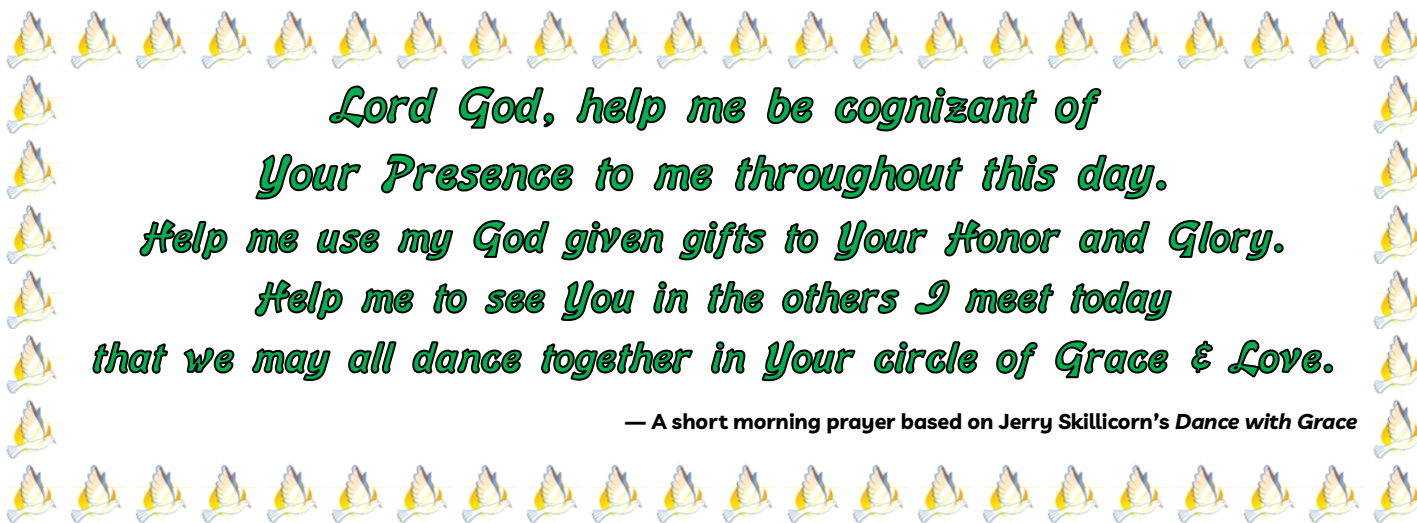
The Brotherhood of St. Andrew
